he period around All Saints' Day directs the thoughts of Christians towards 'the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, and the life everlasting'. There are important connections between what might be called Remembrance-tide and Advent, during which we reflect upon God's judgement on us. While many people think of the saints as examples of 'virtuous and godly living', this hardly does justice to the biblical insight that in our pilgrimage through this world 'we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses'. The saints are the real men and women of every age in whose lives we can glimpse heaven in our midst, and they are also our partners in prayer:

Before thy throne we daily meet As joint-petitioners to thee; In spirit each the other greet And shall again each other see. (Richard Baxter)

But there is a dark side to our standing before the throne of God. We are called to be saints, vet we know and experience ourselves to be sinners, and the seasonal mood changes around this hinge of All Saints towards the darker themes of All Souls' day which follows, when we commemorate the faithful departed. This serious mood remains with us throughout the month - not least on Remembrance Sunday. and combines with the natural feeling of autumn days to focus on a sense of the coming end.

Letter from the Rector

And so to the start of the Church's year and Advent. No one can pretend that the Church is unaffected by the spirit of the age, and the rushed anticipation of Christmas. The result is that Christmas carols crowd out the keeping of a good Advent, which shares with Lent a spirit of restraint, preparation and penitence. The Church is herself caught up in the stubborn popular conception of Advent as a lead into the Christmas festival and hardly has time for the 'earnest looking forward', the watching and waiting for the coming of the King and his kingdom. Traditionally, as we wait in hope, we should turn our minds towards the four last things, to death and judgement, to heaven and hell.

For many people Christmas is the focal point of their religious observance, and the Carol service rather than the Easter vigil provides the ground of their Christian experience. Churches are full at midnight, and St. George's still attracts large numbers on Christmas morning. Whilst not everybody would approve, nevertheless there is a strong residual sense, at least in the Church of England, that the coming of God amongst us in Christ is as important as his death and resurrection. But both glorious feasts are about God's priceless gift of love, the gift of His only Son for His only world, and your only life.

The Revd Dr Richard Fermer

The parish welcomes Fr. Richard and his wife Giseli, as he is Licensed by the Bishop of London on 6th November as Priest-in-Charge of the Grosvenor Chapel. Those responsible for the appointment are delighted we have found an outstanding person who

comes to us from St George's Anglican Church in Paris, where his energetic and imaginative ministry has been much cherished and valued. With his experience of the wider worldwide Church in Brazil and Angola, Fr. Richard will also bring a breadth of vision and knowledge to what can feel like our somewhat parochial matters - important though these be! I look forward very much to working with him over the coming years. Fr Richard's words of greeting to his new congregation appear elsewhere in this Newsletter. The people of God at the Grosvenor Chapel have achieved an extraordinary amount during the 2 year interregnum, with the building beautifully refurbished, new governance arrangements, and the usual busy social and fundraising schedule, and I am very grateful to the Chapel Wardens, the Deputy Chairman and the Committee who have worked so painstakingly and faithfully. Canon Rex Davis has also been a wonderful colleague over the last 18 months or so, and has cared for the community there with great devotion and gentleness, and it has been such fun to have him around. We owe him our huge thanks.

Recent Celebrations

We have had some glorious services this autumn, including Baptism Renewal, Harvest Festival, the Dedication of the Organ, Inaugural recital, and the 350th Anniversary celebration for the Book of Common Prayer with the Royal Society of St George. Thank you to all who supported Homeless people in West London with your Harvest gifts, and to others who have helped in the preparation, delivery and cleaning up for these events.

When the organ was dedicated to the glory of God the preacher, Canon Jeremy Davies, very cleverly and amusingly began with a quote from Dylan Thomas's Under Milk Wood with a perfect Welsh accent. All about Organ Morgan - The church organ player who dreams of music and orchestras within the village. And Mrs. Organ Morgan - his wife who dreams of silence as she is disturbed during the day by Organ Morgan's constant organ-playing.

We were reminded of the first and primary task of this organ - to support and beautify the worship of God. We were told too that this is not just a musical gift...but a visual symbol too of God's majesty and glory...pipes pointing upwards like spires of Cathedrals or Churches. We thank God for many blessings.

For the BCP anniversary service we made slight alterations to the order of the Holy Communion to reflect 1662 usage, and a memorable sermon was preached by The Revd. John Masding who is a Trustee of the Prayer Book Society.

Study leave mid-January until mid-April 2013

The Church of England has a bit of a hit and miss policy when it comes to Study leave, and ideally should be more systematic. Methodist ministers conversely are required to take a sabbatical every 7 or 8 years. Within the Diocese of London stipendiary clergy qualify for a three month period of study leave after ten years of ordained stipendiary ministry (and every ten years thereafter). The Diocesan authorities have approved what will my first Study Leave after 27 years of ordained ministry.

Study Leave is offered to encourage clergy in developing their ministry and continuing in life-long learning; it is seen as an opportunity to stand back from day-to-day ministry and reflect. Specific goals for the period of study leave are identified. However, the guidelines

also require clergy to take rest and relaxation seriously during their period of leave.

Clergy usually spend between half and two-thirds of their time pursuing their agreed goal - and therefore at least a third in rest and relaxation. In my case, I feel I have quite a bit of catching up to do in terms of study, and therefore I plan to be spending at least 3/4 of the sabbatical pursuing agreed goals.

These are as follows:

- i) To make the 8 day individually guided silent Ignatian retreat led by the Jesuits
- ii) To study latest Biblical Scholarship (latest New Testament textbooks and articles in particular)
- iii) To compose a Missa Brevis (Latin setting)

I am very grateful to Canon Rex Davis, who, having cared for the Grosvenor Chapel so wonderfully during the extended interregnum, has agreed to look after St George's whilst I am away and he will cover the services.

My time will begin with the Jesuits in north Wales at St Beuno's at the end of January for an individually guided 8 day silent Ignatian retreat. This will be followed by 3 weeks of study and composing in a Catholic Presbytery, with access to a keyboard of course. At the end of February I head off to Australia for 6 weeks. The plan is to spend 2 weeks with the Order of St Benedict at New Norcia, north of Perth as the guest of Abbot John Herbert OSB. New Norcia is Australia's only monastic town and has a unique heritage. The monastery has a good library, several fine pianos and 2 organs, and it will be possible both to study, compose and pray. This is to be followed by 10 days in Melbourne staying in a small flat with a wonderful C7 Yamaha grand piano. Here I shall have access to the Dalton McCaughey Library, near to the University of Melbourne. It is the largest theological library in the Southern Hemisphere and is the result of many denominations pooling their resources. Then comes a week's holiday north of Sydney,

possibly around Port Macquarrie, or maybe visiting the Hunter Valley. Ending with Holy Week and Easter in Sydney.

On my way home, I hope to stopover a couple of days to see my eldest brother, his wife and two young Japanese nieces near Fukuoka in the south, and also No. 2 brother in South Korea and his family. I last saw my four Korean nieces briefly in 2008 and all are now in their 20s - the youngest is on the point of graduating from university. My first Sunday back at St George's will be for our Patronal Feast which we keep next year on 21st April.

Teaching Sermons

The course of occasional sermons based on material that I use in preparing people for Confirmation is finally concluding. Essentially it is an introduction to the Christian Faith, which I hope will prove useful as a 'refresher' for all of us.

Children at St George's

It is good to see the take up building for what we offer our toddlers and children. We still welcome volunteer help, and hope to be in a position very soon to agree and plan a scheme for the futurue.

Midday Prayer







Opus 18 wins hearts and minds!

Simon Williams recalls the inaugural recital given by James O'Donnell on Thursday 18 October on our new Richards, Fowkes & Co. organ.

ow wonderful it was to see St George's brimming with expectant audience members as the start time of 7.00pm approached, with James O'Donnell poised to launch the mighty first chord of J S Bach's Fantasia and fugue in G minor into the church! How good also to see professional and amateur organists out in force, mixed with parishioners and other donors.

James O'Donnell had worked hard with me to draw up a programme that would please organ buffs and non-specialists alike, embracing a wide range of styles and showing off, as far as is possible in a little over one hour, just how much variety of beautiful organ sounds are available on opus 18. After the majestic full chorus sounds of Bach's Fantasia and Fugue, James O'Donnell explored more chamber music-like sonorities in three chorale preludes, also by Bach and including the famous setting of *Wachet*

auf, ruft uns die Stimme. After the Bach we heard what English organists of the same period were composing and playing, and not just any English organists but John Keeble, second organist of the church (whose tenure lasted from 1744 to 1786) and, of course, George Frideric Handel (if only we knew precisely where his pew at St George's was located!). In this music, gone was the fleet footwork, which is such an integral part of the music by Bach, despatched effortlessly by James O'Donnell and displayed on the giant screen placed on the chancel step, and in came music of grace and charm, performed with effervescent ease and with the most nimble of fingers.

Many readers will know from previous articles about the organ in the parish's newsletter that the Richards, Fowkes' aesthetic is rooted in the eighteenth-century organs of North Germany and Holland. Some must have been wondering how opus 18 would cope with what was to follow. Jehan Alain wrote his second Fantasie in the first part of the twentieth century, his music 'evoking an elusive, surreal world of dreams and fleeting emotions' as David Gammie, writer of the evening's programme notes, put it. And then, what could we expect to hear in Miroir, a minimalist style piece by Dutch progressive rock musician and TV composer Ad Wammes? In the Alain, the wailing. Arabic flavour of the music came across as convincingly as the sounds needed for the music of Bach; whilst in the Wammes, the most

delicate sounds of the organ truly created the 'magically hypnotic effect, like dancing rays of light reflected in glass...' promised by Gammie.

The final item on the programme satisfyingly completed the circle, returning us to the key of G (appropriately now for a concluding piece in the major mode) and to another Fantasia and Fugue, in which the composer Hubert Parry might be said to have been looking at Bach's style through the prism of the music of Mendelssohn and indeed Reger. After sustained applause James O'Donnell treated us to Vierne's always-enjoyable Carillion de Westminster, the chimes of 'Big Ben' sounding ever more clearly as the sun gradually burned through early morning mist and fog lingering over the Thames.

What then remains in the memory of this special evening, the culmination of four years'





work and which itself was the result of so much planning and labour by the Rector, Michael Beckett, Stephen Wikner, Seamus O'Hare, photographer Malcolm Crowthers and others? Well first, the palpable sense of enjoyment radiating from everyone there (and how often do your see 350+ people at a parish church organ recital?); and second (and related to the first) the depth of James O'Donnell's musicianship which opus 18, described by O'Donnell as 'marvellous', allowed him fully to reveal.

The November edition of 'Choir & Organ' magazine carries a fivepage review of opus 18, lavishly illustrated with beautiful photographs and written by leading concert organist Daniel Moult. He ends by saying 'This is unquestionably a truly superb and much needed addition to the London and indeed national - organ scene'. You can hear more of it Sunday by Sunday and in the programme of weekly Tuesday lunchtime 'Mayfair Organ Concerts' which commence on 8 January.



Fr Richard Fermer

On Tuesday 6th November at 7.00pm, the Bishop of London will license the Revd Dr Richard Fermer as Priest-in-Charge of the Grosvenor Chapel at a Sung Eucharist in the Chapel.

Fr Fermer has written the following for the current edition of the Chapel Newsletter and the text is reproduced here with kind permission:-

"All shall be well and all manner of things shall be well."

Your long wait and search for a new priest is over!

am coming to the Grosvenor Chapel with the intention to love and serve you. I hope to be loved by you and together build up the Church as a "school of love" and a light in this world.

I come from the Diocese in Europe and am currently serving as Assistant Priest at St George's, Paris. I was also born abroad of English parents in Lucerne, in Switzerland. The international flavour continues with my wife Giseli, who is Brazilian. We met when I was serving as an USPG Mission Companion in Recife. She works as a massage therapist and beautician. We have been married just under three years.



Other than that I have strong English roots. As a young adult my faith took me on an intellectual quest. I studied theology and philosophy at Oxford, followed by a Masters and a PhD at King's College London. At the same time, my teaching and interest in spirituality was leading me ever more to valuing the importance of community and Christian service. This slowly drew me to the priesthood, and I was trained at the College of the Resurrection, Mirfield, in a setting where prayer, liturgy and community were at the centre. Subsequently, I served as a Curate at St. John's, Palmers Green, a very mixed and vibrant North London parish. Being single at the time, I chose to offer myself to serve abroad in mission. I spent four years in Brazil teaching at their theological colleges, but also engaged in pastoral work in the parishes. Upon my return to the UK I looked for a church that would embrace this international experience and found one at St George's in Paris, which has both an English-speaking congregation with a wonderful choral tradition and a francophone Malagasy community. At the same time. the Diocese of London approached me to become the Supervisor of the "ALMA Mission and Ministry Programme" in Angola. London Diocese has a companion relationship with Angola and I have visited the country every year since my appointment to support their training programme for lay and ordained ministry.

Giseli and I are delighted to be coming to the Grosvenor Chapel, to a congregation which, I've been told, is hungry to grow in faith, understanding and service. I am keen to help develop your work with children and families, and to reach out to the local community.

After having visited the Chapel last Sunday, the image came to me that it is like a small, hidden jewel in residential Mayfair. The building is a beautiful jewel in itself, an expression of the love of its people over the centuries. My hope is that this jewel will continue to shine by incarnating, in worship and community, the radiance of Christ, ever transparent to the glory of the Father. Please do make this a part of your prayers as you prepare to receive a new priest.







Midday Prayer at St George's

A Cranmerian reflection by the Parish Administrator on the occasion of the 350th anniversary of the Book of Common Prayer


t is often said that Archbishop
Thomas Cranmer's greatest
bequest to the English speaking
world is the quality of the language used in the Book of Common
Prayer. Personally, I would add
that a no less significant gift to
latter day English Christians is that
he also greatly simplified the liturgy
of the medieval Church.

Aside from the Mass, this liturgy consisted primarily of the daily 'offices': Matins (said during the night), Lauds (said at dawn), Prime (said early in the morning), Terce (at the third hour or 9 o'clock), Sext (at the sixth hour or midday), None (at the 9th hour or 3,00pm), Vespers


(at the lighting of the evening lamps) and Compline (said just before bed time at about 9.00pm).

Cranmer swept all this away. He conflated Matins, Lauds and Prime into his 'office' of Morning Prayer, and Vespers and Compline into Evening Prayer or Evensong and that's the way it remained until relatively recently. But the casualties of this reformed 'Godly Order' were the so-called 'little offices' of Terce, Sext and None.

Public recitation of Mattins and Evensong is of course a relative rarity these days. However since earlier in the year, every day at 12.10pm, except on Fridays and major feastdays when there is a celebration of Holy Communion, those who happen to be in St George's are invited to join 'the home team' in saying Midday



Prayer. The service consists of a psalm, a short passage of scripture, the Lord's Prayer and a collect, using texts to which 'the late Archbishop' could surely take no exception. Sometimes there are just one or two of us, sometimes a handful more. But numbers are not the issue. The important thing is that just after midday, every day without exception, St George's is used for the purpose for which it was built. For those of us who take part, it is often an inconvenience - all too often one's in the middle of something - but that surely is the point, or at least one of them. If those of us concerned one way or the other with the church's business can't put down that busyness for just five minutes each day to acknowledge the God we purport to serve, things have truly reached a pretty pass. The other point is that those in the wider St George's family - and indeed those outside that family to whom such things matter can go about their daily lives in the knowledge that prayers are being offered daily on their behalf in their Church.



e are planning to reintroduce Film Night, started some years ago by Revd John Slater when he was Rector, but which fell into decline when he became ill. screenings will be held on Sunday evenings at St George's, about six times a year. The first screening will be "The Great Mr Handel", one of the first Technicolor films made at Denham, released in 1942. It will be shown on Sunday 3rd March 2013 at 6.00pm.





Funeral Planning


